### WELCOME & INTRODUCTIONS, APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Chairman Lapsley called the meeting to order, requested that everyone introduce himself or herself, read the Ethics Statement and inquired if there were any conflicts of interest to note for today's meeting.

### APPROVAL OF AGENDA

The agenda was presented for approval with no modification requested.

Anthony Sutton moved to approve the agenda as presented. Bob Davy seconded and the motion carried without further discussion.

### PUBLIC COMMENT

Chairman Lapsley called for any public comments. None were received.

### CONSENT AGENDA

Bob Davy moved to approve the consent agenda consisting of the January 23, 2020 minutes with a minor change, and the Citizens' Advisory Committee Applications. Gwen Wisler seconded and the motion carried without further discussion.

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### NEW BUSINESS

#### Draft Project List for Prioritization

The Prioritization Process (aka, SPOT) is the process in which the majority of funding decisions are made for transportation improvement projects. North Carolina has a relatively unique process for prioritizing projects that is data-driven and transparent, as mandated by the Strategic Transportation Investments law. MPOs, RPOs, and NCDOT Division work together to develop and prioritize projects across the state with the goal of efficiently using transportation funds to enhance infrastructure while supporting economic growth and local needs.

Tristan Winkler shared that MPO staff assembled a Draft SPOT Project list from meetings with local government staff as well as the Henderson TAC. He also shared a brief presentation on the prioritization process.

Discussion occurred regarding the prioritization process including how local government units select projects. The scoring process was also discussed including what makes up the quantitative score and how projects compete with other projects across the state.

Projects that are submitted in the SPOT process will be under consideration for funding for the 2023-2032 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). This list of projects would go before the TCC and Board in February, go out for public comment in February, and go back to the TCC and Board for final approval in March. Submittals are due to the SPOT office by the end of April. This is the first major step in the prioritization process to determine what projects would receive funding.

Projects that are either in the Developmental portion of the TIP (funded for right-of-way in FY 2026 or later) or are considered a “Sibling” of a project in the TIP are automatically resubmitted into the next round of prioritization, unless requested otherwise. Carryover projects do not count towards the MPO’s 25 submittals for each mode. By the end of the prioritization process, projects that are funded are included in the TIP.

Bob Davy moved to approve the Draft Project List. Brian Caskey seconded and the motion carried without further discussion.

#### Safety Performance Targets

As part of MAP-21 requirements in 2012, safety performance measures became a requirement for MPOs and DOTs. Beginning in 2017, as part of the FAST Act, states established annual targets in the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) report. Safety targets are established annually, based on the calendar year, are set for all five performance measure based on five year rolling averages of data, and require coordination between state DOTs and MPOs. The five performance measures include: 1) number of fatalities, 2) rate of fatalities per 100 Million VMT, 3) number of serious injuries, 4) rate of serious injuries per 100 Million VMT and, 5) number of non-motorized fatalities and non-motorized serious injuries.

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NCDOT submitted statewide safety performance measure targets in August 2019 to FHWA. FBRMPO has 180 days (until February 27, 2020) to establish safety targets by either agreeing to plan and program projects so that they contribute toward the accomplishment of NCDOT's safety target for that performance measure; or committing to a different set of quantifiable targets for safety performance measures for the FBRMPO region. NCDOT's 2020 safety targets that were provided to FHWA in the 2019 HSIP report are listed below:

### Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) (per year % reduction)

- For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce total fatalities by 6.23 percent each year from 1,396.4 (2014-2018 average) to 1,227.8 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.
- For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce the fatality rate by 5.39 percent each year from 1.211 (2014-2018 average) to 1.084 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.
- For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce total serious injuries by 8.54 percent each year from 3,362.6 (2014-2018 average) to 2,812.8 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.
- For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce the serious injury rate by 7.64 percent each year from 2.886 (2014-2018 average) to 2.462 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.
- For the 2020 Highway Safety Improvement Plan (HSIP), the goal is to reduce the total non-motorized fatalities and serious injuries by 7.13 percent each year from 494.6 (2014-2018 average) to 426.6 (2016-2020 average) by December 31, 2020.

Discussion occurred regarding the safety targets and what happens if those are not met. It was also noted that the MPO region has a high level of biking on the roads, which could lead to higher levels of accidents and serious injury. Nick Kroncke noted that HSIP projects have specific safety components. In terms of the prioritization process, projects are scored, based in part, on how many crashes have occurred on the roadway in the past five years.

Discussion occurred about how data is reported and it was shared that a motor vehicle would need to be involved in an accident in order for it to be reported. Tristan Winkler noted that the MPO conducts bike/ped counts around the region.

Rebecca McCall moved to adopt a resolution supporting NCDOT Safety Performance Measure Targets. Bob Davy seconded and the motion carried without further discussion.

### MTP 2045 Updates

The Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) is a federally required planning document that MPOs are required to update and maintain to reflect planned transportation investments in the region over the next twenty-five years. The MTP is required to be fiscally constrained, meaning that projects in the MTP have to

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be reasonably expected to work within projected revenues. The French Broad River MPO is required to update its MTP every five years with the next update due in September 2020.

French Broad River MPO staff presented on what the Prioritization Subcommittee has been working on for the MTP including: Finalizing Goals and Objectives, Financial Plan Assumptions, and Project Selection.

In addition, MPO staff plan to hold workshops around the region in March. These include: March 2nd: Henderson County Public Library (Hendersonville) and March 5th: Waynesville Public Library (Waynesville).

## Final FY 2021 Unified Planning Work Program

The French Broad River MPO is required to develop a Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) by March, 2020. A draft was previously brought before the TCC and Board in January. The MPO is also required to consider a self-certification resolution that reflects that the MPO is following federal requirements.

### What is a UPWP?

The UPWP is a federally mandated document for MPO's to produce that is, essentially, the MPO's budget. This includes line items of work for MPO staff as well as studies being carried out using federal planning funds.

### Major Changes between the FY 2020 and FY 2021 UPWP

- The 2045 MTP is expected to be completed early in the fiscal year so less funding will be put towards developing the MTP
- More funding is being put towards TIP Development/Prioritization to go along with P 6.0
- More funding is being put towards Special Study Coordination with the Regional Transit Study and Corridor Studies expected to be on-going.
- More funding is being put towards Statewide Coordination with MPO Staff on the Statewide Resiliency Workgroup, SPOT Workgroup, Non-Motorized Planning Workgroup, and Data Users Workgroup.
- Less funding is being put towards "Regional Planning" with the 2045 MTP expected to be adopted in August, 2020.
- The Regional Transit Study, Richland Creek Greenway Study, and Asheville Bike/Ped Count Equipment have all been moved to FY 2021

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# INTRODUCTION

In compliance with Federal law and guidelines, the French Broad River Metropolitan Planning Organization (FBRMPO) has developed a Unified Planning Work Program (PWP) for Fiscal Year 2021 that will help to carry out a cooperative, comprehensive, and continuous transportation planning process for the FBRMPO Planning Area.

In general, the PWP is the FBRMPO's budget for personnel tasks and planning studies, either carried out by the MPO or studies using MPO planning funds carried out by member governments. The PWP is largely funded by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA), with reimbursements managed by the North Carolina Department of Transportation. PWP's can have five general funding sources:

**-Statewide Planning and Research Program (SPR)-** These funds are used by NCDOT to conduct work for the French Broad River MPO. (No SPR funds are programmed in FY 2021 PWP)

**-FHWA Section 104(f) Funds-** These funds are dedicated to MPO planning areas to perform metropolitan transportation planning tasks. A 20% local match is required.

**-FTA Section 5303 Funds-** These funds are used for transit planning in the MPO planning area by the region's 5303 Direct Recipient, the City of Asheville. The FTA provides 80% of these funds, NCDOT provides 10%, and the City of Asheville provides the 10% local match

**-FHWA Surface Transportation Block Grant Program- Direct Attributable Funds-** The funds are dedicated to Transportation Management Areas and these funds can be used for transportation planning. A 20% local match is required.

The local match requirements are shared by dues paying members of the French Broad River MPO in direct proportion to population within the MPO, per the 2010 US Census.



## Amendments to the FBRMPO CTP

### Very Brief Overview

The Comprehensive Transportation Plan (MTP) is a state-required planning document that is created by NCDOT Transportation Planning Division in cooperation with the MPO and NCDOT Divisions. The CTP primarily lists areas with deficiencies or needs and gives preliminary purpose and needs to prospective projects.



### Update

The FBRMPO's CTP has not been updated since 2008 but a number of projects not listed in the CTP have been requested by local governments. These include:

- Modernization of Blue Ridge Road in Buncombe County
- Improving the intersection of North Main Street and US 25B (Asheville Highway) in Hendersonville
- Upgrading Woodfin Street from College Street to Lexington Avenue in Asheville

Action: Consider Approval of CTP Amendments

TCC Recommendation: Approve

## CTP Amendments Resulting from P6.0

The following projects are being considered for submission into the prioritization process, referred to as “SPOT”, and will be considered for funding in the 2023-2032 Transportation Improvement Program. As part of this process, it is required that projects being entered into SPOT are also in the Comprehensive Transportation Plan, or CTP. The French Broad River MPO CTP was adopted in 2008, with the most recent amendments in 2013, and the following projects were not included in the CTP. These amendments consider the need for new projects as priorities and identify needed improvements. ### Project: Blue Ridge Road

**From:** I-40      **To:** NC 9      **Municipality (County):** Black Mountain (Buncombe)

**Improvement Type:** Modernization

**SPOT/CTP ID:** H171779

**Purpose and Need:** This two-lane facility currently provides a east-west connection in the southern part of Black Mountain, connecting NC 9 to US 70. The roadway has 12’ lanes with a minimal paved shoulder width of 1’. The 2017 AADT volumes were 4,500 with a projected 2045 AADT of 9,900.

The Blue Ridge road interchange project, TIP I-4409, will likely increase volumes on this segment and open the area to further development. The interchange project, in addition to alleviating freight traffic from navigating through Downtown Black Mountain, will include improvements of the section of Blue Ridge road from I-40 to Blue Ridge Assembly Drive. Blue Ridge road has a close proximity to a new access road serving expanding industrial and commercial industries, and there will likely be growing commuter and freight traffic.

Blue Ridge Road should be brought up to current standards with improved shoulders, sidewalks, and intersection improvements, where necessary to address safety and projected congestion concerns. The Black Mountain Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan recommends sidewalks on this section of roadway, in order to connect destinations on NC 9 to the park and destinations on US 70. The Plan also calls for a bike able shoulder (minimum of five feet) or bike lane on the entirety of this segment.

## Project: Woodfin Street

**From:** College Street    **To:** Lexington Ave    **Municipality (County):** Asheville (Buncombe)

**Improvement Type:** Roadway Upgrade

**SPOT/CTP ID:** N/A

**Purpose and Need:** This facility provides a connection between College Street on the east entrance to downtown Asheville and leads towards N. Lexington Avenue in downtown. There are multiple destinations along this corridor including hotels, apartments, churches, and multiple venues. On the eastern section from College Street to Central Avenue, the roadway is a three-lane section with a two-way-center-turn-lane and on street parking. From Central to Lexington, the roadway becomes a four-lane cross section. The road has curb and gutter, with sidewalks on both sides. The 2017 AADT volumes were 7,300.

With volumes anticipated to increase to 13,000 by 2045, this roadway should be brought up to standards to improve safety and address congestion concerns at the intersection of Woodfin and Broadway. Improvements to this section of roadway should fit within the context of a downtown with improvements to bicycle and pedestrian accommodations. Between 2007 and 2018, 11 pedestrian crashes and one bicycle crash were reported along this section of roadway.

## Project: US 25B/Asheville Highway at North Main Street Intersection

**From:** --    **To:** --    **Municipality (County):** Hendersonville (Henderson)

**Improvement Type:** Intersection Improvement

**SPOT/CTP ID:** H184193

**Purpose and Need:** This intersection is at the convergence of US 25, N. Main Street and N. Church Street with a large amount of traffic being generated from Hendersonville High School. This intersection is just north of downtown Hendersonville and serves as a crucial north-south connection, with 28,500 AADT on Asheville Highway, and 10,000 AADT on N. Main Street, this intersection frequently experiences congestion and can be a major bottleneck to travel north of downtown.

With volumes anticipated to increase by roughly 40% by 2045, congestion and safety concerns at this intersection should be addressed. Given the surrounding context with a school and residential neighborhoods, sidewalk and multimodal infrastructure are important to the intersection design. This intersection is also included in the Blue Ridge Bike Plan for proposed bike lanes, connecting N. Main to US 25 and NC 191.



# Item 4C:

## Final Project Submittal List for Prioritization

### Very Brief Overview

The Prioritization Process (aka, SPOT) is the process in which the majority of funding decisions are made for transportation improvement projects. North Carolina has a relatively unique process for prioritizing projects that is data-driven and transparent, as mandated by the Strategic Transportation Investments law. MPOs, RPOs, and NCDOT Division work together to develop and prioritize projects across the state with the goal of efficiently using transportation funds to enhance infrastructure while supporting economic growth and local needs.



### What's Happening Now

MPO staff assembled a Draft SPOT Project list from meetings with local government staff as well as the Henderson TAC. Projects that are submitted in the SPOT process will be *under consideration* for funding for the 2023-2032 Transportation Improvement Program. This list of projects will go before the TCC and Board in February, go out for public comment in February, and go back to the TCC and Board for final approval in March. Submittals are due to the SPOT office by the end of April. This is the first major step in the prioritization process to determine what projects will get funded.
