

Urbanized Area Boundaries

Release Update

After every decennial census, the Census Bureau releases data on Urbanized Areas that determines urban vs. rural areas in the United States. The data for 2020 is planned to be released on December 29, 2022. This information has significant implications on federal funding both in terms of what type of funding may come to an area and how much. In this iteration, the Census Bureau has made several changes to the criteria for urbanized areas, including raising the minimum threshold for an urbanized area to 5,000 residents or 2,000 housing units, using housing unit density instead of population density to determine urban areas, and reducing "jumps" from the urban core to other blocks urban blocks from 2.5 miles to 1.5 miles. We anticipate these changes may result in some significant changes to what is currently delineated as the Asheville Urbanized Area but until that data is released, we won't know exactly what those changes are.



Paved Trail and Multimodal Grants

The N.C. Department of Transportation (NCDOT) has established a new Paved Trails and Sidewalk Feasibility Study Grant program to evaluate proposed paved trails, greenways, sidewalks and side paths. Feasibility studies examine the viability of a transportation project, complete initial stages of design and environmental review, and develop implementation strategies. The feasibility study further enables communities to examine route alternatives, develop cost estimates, and advance projects to compete for additional funding for design and construction.

This grant hopes to bridge the gap between conceptual planning and programming of projects. \$2 million will be available for paved trails and \$500k for traditional sidewalk and shared use paths. Currently, the MPO is assisting multiple municipalities in applying for this funding. Woodfin Greenway Public Meeting


The Town of Woodfin held a public meeting this past October to get public input on the Woodfin Greenway/Blueway plans. The multi-use pedestrian path will run North from I-26/US-19 exit 25 to Elk Mountain Road and will connect to the North Rivers Arts District Greenway when both projects are complete. Along with the paved greenway, the project scope includes two parks, one with a recreational whitewater wave facility adjacent to it.

At the meeting, attendees were able to weigh in on alternative routes and different facilities that each of the two parks could have. There was also a presentation on the status of the project, its goals, and its timeline. Throughout the meeting, employees of the Town were stationed around the room to answer questions and assist people in understanding the scope of the project. French Broad River West Pedestrian Count

As always, our trusty Eco-Counter is used on greenways and downtown areas for weeklong periods to gauge usage on these pathways. This count was done on the new section of the French Broad River West Greenway, by the dog park. This count was completed in early November during a chilly but sunny week!
